From the President's Desk Marylou MacDonald

Group discussions can inspire candid dialogues about previously shrouded matters of mortality. A special invitation is extended to you to attend our Annual Meeting and experience a Death Café, especially if you have never encountered one before. A Death Café is a get-together scheduled by a nonprofit group for the purpose of talking over food and drink about death. The goal is to educate and help others become more familiar with one's end of life.

The idea originated in 2004 with Swiss sociologist and anthropologist, Bernard Crettaz, to help people make the most of their finite lives. Crettaz wanted to revive the pagan tradition of the funeral feast, wherein the living would renew their bonds while letting go of what weighed on their hearts. The overbearing secrecy surrounding the topic of death is a thing of the past. It is said that there is a need among people to open the closet into which death, the last taboo, has been placed to reduce fear and enable people to live more fully.

In 2011, Death Cafe founder Jon Underwood held the first Death Café based on Crettaz's ideas at his home in London. At that time he stated that we have lost control of one of the most significant events we ever have to face.

The first American event was held in 2012 by a Columbus, Ohio, hospice worker, Lizzy Miles. Worldwide, over 8,000 have been held just since this past mid-March. Lizzy still holds periodic and well-attended Death Cafes. Clintonville Community Resource Center hosted one this past March. Our annual meeting will host an interactive Death Café. Come

The People's Memorial Association of Seattle, Washington Alliance announced in their October 2018 newsletter that their Co-op Funeral Home is now offering Aquamation, also known as Alkaline Hydrolysis as an alternative to cremation. This process uses water and lye to reduce a body to bone fragments and an inert liquid. It produces less carbon dioxide and pollutants and utilizes 87.5% less energy than cremation. In terms of saving the environment, cremation is like driving a diesel truck, and aquamation, like driving a Prius. A "Green Burial Survey" conducted in June 2018 received 1,750 responses with 78% choosing cremation as their preferred disposition, 15% preferred Green Burial and only 2%

The Funeral Consumers Alliance advises individuals to plan ahead for funerals and burials and to make their wishes known to family and friends. A unique way of conveying a wish to family and friends appeared in the New York Times, June 15, 2018. When Jason Rosenthal's wife. knew she was dying, she published a Modern Love essay, entitled, "You May Want to Marry My Husband". In so doing, she gave her blessing to his remarriage. He received numerous responses from women who wanted to fill his wife's spot. As you think of your own wishes for a funeral and burial, Rosenthal suggests that you "talk with your mate, your

children and other loved ones about what you want for them when you are gone".
